Teacher Checklist: Supporting Gifted and Talented Learners

Differentiated Instruction

- Use flexible grouping so GT students work with both peers of similar ability and mixed-ability groups.
- Provide tiered assignments that adjust depth/complexity rather than giving 'more of the same.'
- Offer choice boards/learning menus so students can pursue interests while meeting objectives.

Recognizing Giftedness Beyond Test Scores

- Use multiple measures: portfolios, performance-based tasks, creativity assessments, and observations.
- Look for nontraditional strengths (e.g., leadership, problem-solving, artistic or creative expression).
- Apply culturally responsive identification tools that reflect diverse backgrounds and talents.

Preventing Underachievement & Boosting Engagement

- Pre-assess and use curriculum compacting to let students 'test out' of mastered content.
- Provide enrichment projects (independent studies, passion projects, inquiry-based learning).
- Teach goal-setting and self-monitoring skills to help GT students manage challenges.

Supporting Social-Emotional Needs

- Create a classroom culture that values curiosity, creativity, and diverse ways of thinking.
- Model and encourage a growth mindset (praise effort and persistence, not just results).
- Connect GT students with peer groups, clubs, or mentors who share their interests.

Ensuring Equity & Access

- Use universal screening instead of relying only on teacher referrals.
- Partner with families to gather cultural and linguistic insights about student strengths.
- Provide scaffolds (sentence stems, bilingual resources, visuals) so CLED learners can demonstrate ability.

Professional Growth & Collaboration

- Seek ongoing PD on GT education and equity practices.
- Review case studies or student profiles that show giftedness in diverse forms.
- Collaborate with GT specialists, ESL teachers, and school psychologists to design inclusive enrichment.
